- 3. Analyze, discuss, and distinguish the roles of art, architecture, and the artist from the Renaissance to the contemporary period.

Work-based Learning

These opportunities will provide you with a deeper, more engaging and relevant learning environment. This semester, I will be offering WBL activities in order to provide you with the opportunity to explore career options that would be applicable to applicable careers.

The following are WBL assignments: virtual gallery or museum attendance, offered in a discussion and as enrichment in the Read & Reflect and optional extras of each module.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

What you need for success in this class:

- You must prioritize this course and submit assignments on time. Deadlines divide up the learning material into chunks so the six-week time period is achievable. If you follow this successfully you will earn the units for this class in six weeks.

Print and keep handy the *Quick Guide* and/or *Syllabus*. Both list complete deadlines for every assignment. This will help you stay on track.

Instructor Expectations:

- Students who do not submit the Module 0 self-check quiz by 11:59 pm June 21 may be dropped for nonattendance because we need a legal record that you have engaged with the class. Logging in and taking a look around is not enough. Participation in the Introduction discussion is due June 23.
- If you are unable to complete the quiz by this date: Contact your instructor.
- If you stop attending class, make sure to drop yourself from the class.
- Work is to be turned in on due date no late work is accepted.
- You are responsible for knowing and observing due dates for all assignments.

Attendance and Participation

In this course, your taking quizzes and participation in discussions and is how I will gauge your "attendance." Thus, meeting the due dates for discussions is very important. The beauty of an online course is that you can fit your studying in around your schedule. This doesn't mean, however, that the course is self-paced.

Add/Drop Policy

If, after reviewing the syllabus and orientation unit, you feel this is not the right course for you, please let me know ASAP, so that you can be dropped from the course and another student can be added in your place.

Students who miss more than two graded assignments (discussions, or quizzes or other assessments) may be dropped from the course. In addition, students who fail to log in to the course for 7 consecutive days risk being dropped from the course. If you are struggling, experiencing access issues, or are seriously ill, please contact me immediately so we can develop a success plan together.

Late Work

Late work interrupts the flow of learning in this course and could cause serious problems.

Discussions, in particular, are designed to be interactive--the feedback you give to and get from your peers is just as valuable as any feedback you will receive from me.

For this reason, late work is discouraged, and some late work will not be accepted. Late work will receive a 10% reduction in the grade. Work submitted after 1 week of the due date will not be accepted.

If an emergency arises, such as illness or a family emergency, please let me know as soon as possible. I can't reiterate enough that your success is my central goal, but your success also involves a partnership between you and me that is supported by strong communication.

Essay Grading Policy:

- Essays are graded on a percent of 100.
- Grade reflects the overall quality of the work turned in, how complete the work is and whether the instructions from the assignment were properly followed.
- A rubric will be used to grade the essays.
- Missing or unsatisfactory work will be scored "no credit." This is a 0 (F) and averaged into your grade.
- Essays that do not follow the prompt instructions will receive a 0 (F).

Essays & Plagiarism:

- You will be writing one short opinion essay and one 600–900-word opinion essay.
- All essays will be turned in to a plagiarism checker.
- So that your essay is not cited for plagiarism, the report should be 15% or less.



- Any essay that is found to include plagiarism will receive a zero.
- Be aware that Canvas now has an AI detection tool so do not use Chatgpt. Grammarly may also be flagged.

Discussion Forums:

You will participate in six discussions and one creative project asking you post your project in a discussion to share it. Late posts are not possible.

Your discussion forum consists of three parts:

- 1. Part 1: Your initial post.
- 2. Part 2: Response to two of your peers.
- 3. Make sure to answer all questions asked in the prompt.
- 4. In your initial response make sure to be aware of academic language, paragraph structure, sentence structure, and grammar to the best of your ability.

Quizzes:

- Quizzes are given throughout the semester.
- Be aware of the due dates.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out- of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Note: The above statement means this class should take you approximately 5 hours per week during a normal semester, Spring and Fall. This time estimate is exponentially increased for Summer and Winter sessions.

Extra credit opportunities:

- A successfully written rough draft of the artwork description submitted before the 600-900 word opinion essay will be 30 points. See Module 3.
- If an embedded tutor is assigned to this class, each meeting a student has with the tutor shall earn him or her 10 points.
- Each meeting with another tutor at the Learning Center will earn 10 points.

Students are required to complete a 600-900 word opinion essay, meeting specific requirements outlined in the assignment. It will be submitted to a plagiarism service on Canvas. Below are the factors on which it will graded. THIS ESSAY IS NOT TO INCLUDE ANY BIOGRAPHICAL OR HISTORICAL. INFORMATION.
