Course Description

An introduction to the study of human behavior and cognition. Includes consideration of many of the major topics in psychology including, but not limited to, the biology of behavior, learning, human development, sleep and consciousness, personality, mental disorders and therapy, and social processes. (C-ID PSY 110) (CSU, UC)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Recommended: Twelfth grade reading level is highly recommended.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. identify basic parts and functions of the neuron and lobes of the brain (ILO1; ILO2; ILO3)
- 2. identify different parenting styles and their effect on human development (ILO1; ILO2; ILO3)
- 3. identify major psychological disorders, key symptoms, and the main strategies used for treatment (ILO1; ILO2; ILO3; ILO5)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. discuss the development of psychology as a science.
- 2. identify the major biologic response systems of the human body and discuss their influence on behavior.
- 3. discuss the difference between sensation and perception, giving one illustration of each.
- 4. define consciousness and describe how sleep, psychoactive substances and other stimuli affect consciousness.
- 5. identify and describe the major theories of human development and discuss how growth and development affect
- discuss the processes by which humans learn and store skills and information.
- 7. discuss major theories of personality, their assumptions and implications.
- 8. outline the nature, causes, and treatments of abnormal behavior.



- 9. discuss the ways in which the social milieu affects human behavior.
- 10. identify major theories of emotion and motivation.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

<u>Method of evaluation</u>: Class activities, attendance, homework, quizzes, problem solving exercise, and written assignments.

Instructional Methodology: Audio, visual, demonstration, discussion, group activity, and lecture.

<u>Quizzes:</u> There will be 6 quizzes. More details about the quizzes are posted in Canvas. The quizzes will cover chapters and course material throughout the semester. No makeups for exams will be given without prior notification and/or documentation of an emergency.

Discussions: Each module has a discussion board. Students must participate in each discussion in the form of one original post, and one response post per module. Original posts must contain at least 5 - 10 full sentences and response posts must contain 5 full sentences for full credit. Discussion posts are due at each module's due date. Initial discussion post is due by Friday and reply posts due by Monday at 11:59 pm.

Reflection Paper: Students will be required to submit a 2-3 page APA format thought paper (not including the title and reference page). Details in Canvas modules.

Assignments: There will be 3 various assignments due. More details will be posted in the Canvas modules.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.
