Course Description

A course for speakers with little or no oral or written competency and limited L1 literacy. Students will learn literacy skills that will build a foundation for further ESL training or to form a foundation for their ability to operate within the U.S. culture. Literacy skills include the development of fine motor skills, the ability to follow a line of print from left to right, and the identification of alphabetic, numeric, and time symbols. Included will be instruction in culturally appropriate Non-verbal communication, greetings and farewells, basic social skills, school conduct, courtesies, etc. This course will provide basic literacy foundation for L2 learners so they may operate in their home and their immediate environment. (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Provide basic personal information such as name and address.
- 2. Identify, in English, parts of the body.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Pronounce, write, and recognize numbers.
- 2. Write and recite the alphabet.
- 3. Use culturally appropriate social gestures such as waving, shaking hands, direct eye contact, nodding "yes" or "no", shrugging "I don't know".
- 4. Write one's name and address and phone number.
- 5. Understand the basics of personal hygiene.
- 6. Use and respond to simple greetings, farewells, and courtesies.



- 7. Conduct themselves appropriately in the classroom, including raising one's hand, waiting one's turn, being non-disruptive, responding to simple classroom commands.
- 8. Point to common parts of body, express one's state of health/being in one ore two words, answer simple questions about oneself.
