Course Description

Course of study is designed to develop competency in the accurate use of medical vocabulary to include anatomy, physiology, diseases, and descriptive terms to prepare students for entry-level positions as medical transcribers, clinical editors, health insurance processors, and patient administration specialists. - 4. Describe components of nomenclature, disorders and descriptive terms of the integumentary system.
- 5. Describe components of nomenclature, disorders, articulation of joints and descriptive terms of the skeletal system.

- 7. Describe components of nomenclature, disorders and descriptive terms of the nervous system.

- 10. Describe components of nomenclature, disorders and descriptive terms of the lymphatic system.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Course instructions may include class lecture, discussion, group discussion, audio/ visual, computer assisted instructions, online programs, presentations, canvas communication and canvas assignments. Two (2) hours of independent work done out of class per each hour of lecture or class work, or the equivalent per unit is expected each week. The course meetings will occur at the scheduled days and times.

ATTENDANCE
