Course Description

A beginning course stressing the basic skills of listening comprehension, speaking, reading and writing, to develop control of the sounds and the basic forms and structure of French. Introduction to aspects of French culture and civilization. Not open to students who have completed three years of high school French. (CSU/UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Communicate ideas about simple everyday activities, for example, work, restaurant, sports.
2. In response to prompts, use salutations, identify themselves and communicate information related to their immediate surroundings.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate comprehension of basic grammatical structures such as gender, adjective agreement, regular and irregular verb conjugations and partitive structures.
2. Recognize basic everyday vocabulary (clothing, family, food ...) as well as survival vocabulary (introductions, phone usage, asking for directions).

3. Combine knowledge of grammar and vocabulary in written and oral compositions based on specific topics given by instructor.
4. Perform his/her knowledge of basic and survival vocabulary through responding to instructor's questions and role-playing with other students.
5. Demonstrate aural comprehension through his/her ability to participate in meaningful oral communication and improvisations in one-on-one situations with instructor.
6. Discover aspects of French civilization and culture through selected readings and in-class discussions.
7. Summarize the readings both orally and written focusing on main elements of the passages.

Practice and repeat both orally and written structures introduced in the classroom in weekly individual language laboratory sessions

This semester we will use the online textbook: *Liberté* which is a free online textbook. French 100 will cover chapters 1-6. You can use the online pdf version provided in the Canvas course, or you can print out the chapters.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

- French 1 is designed to prepare students with basic speaking, reading, and writing in French. An introduction to certain elements of the various French and Francophone cultures around the world will also be explored. The course will be conducted mainly in French and **everyone is strongly encouraged to speak French** as it is really the only way to acquire automatism. In French Class, we will cover mainly GRAMMAR *and PART A* (activities in pair, groups, or individuals) + supplemental activities for the class and/or for HW are also on Canvas Chapters [Modules](#) To have access to every assessment detail (content, due date, format etc) you have many options and you may want to go to Syllabus and Chapters Modules.
- There are six academic modules corresponding to the manual *Liberté* chapters. On Canvas, each chapter module follows the same patterns such as the pronunciation section, vocabulary section, conjugation section, and grammaire section: there are supplemental resources for the manual and they will be used in class or at home (as directed). However, our base is our manual *Liberté*, written by Gretchen Angelo. In each chapter module, you will find the agenda of each session in addition to your HW. Guidelines for written tests and oral tests will be also available.
- Each chapter has a duration of four to five classes. However, there are in total three tests. Each test combines two chapters. Those three tests have two parts: the written part is done at home on Canvas French1 and you will have a window of almost one week to submit your work. There will be the individual oral French interview test (4-5mn max). This last part will occur via Zoom or during Class normal hours and you will choose a particular time.
- Be aware that tests and quizzes are under a time limit (once you start you cannot stop) and it is essential to **present only your work without any help** (people, book, translator, or else). With regular work and guidelines, you will succeed. Trust yourself! You have all abilities to succeed in French 1 class.

- For each class, you need to have completed and self-corrected your homework (HW). The HW is in parts B and C. You will submit your chapter HW only at the end of the two weeks in this appropriate place on Chapters Modules. Please read well the title of the assignment. Doing HW regularly helps you to retain better the information learned in class and in addition, it will contribute to creating a dynamic class. HW parts have written and oral exercises. You will find the HW to do (select the chapter) or in the Module corresponding to the chapter.
- For parts B and C, *you self-correct your exercises, so please look at the answer key at the end of each chapter.* If it is all correct, put a *checkmark*. If some answers need correction, write the right answers. Note that in order to have an entire *grade* for each HW, you will need to do your HW and do the self-correction, and submit them (of course). Otherwise, it will result in half the points or a zero. Once again, doing your HW will help you to better handle the language and also will help you to participate better in class.
- There are six audio files---one per chapter. Just scroll to the time indicated on the exercise in order to find the exercise that you wish to work on. If at first, you can't understand the exercise try it two or three times then mark it and move on. Try coming back to it later or when you are reviewing it.
RECORDING VIRELANGUE ASSIGNMENT
- You will listen to 3-6 French tongue twisters recordings on Chapters Modules. Then you will read and repeat them and finally, you will record them on Mp3 or another format adequate.
LATE WORK
- Late work will not be accepted for full credit. If you have any extenuating circumstances, please contact me at Leticia.pastrana@imperial.edu or Pronto to make alternate arrangements, I will do my best to accommodate in emergency situations. Please, do not hesitate to email me, I am here to help. As I always say "Use but do not abuse" :-). Assignments that CANVAS marks as late have a 50% late deduction. It's still important that you do everything.
- Talkabroad conversation tables: You will create an account at www.talkabroad.com. Here you will sign up during the semester to participate in 20 min conversations with native speakers and other students. The price is free for the semester and allows you to sign up for one conversation table per week. These conversations are between 2 native speakers with students listening to the conversation. At certain times, they will ask students questions they have already asked and answered, but you are free to volunteer to answer questions.
- **Presentations:** There will be two presentations in class. The first is due in week 3 of class. It is on element of French culture. The fourth and final presentation will be done during finals week. This fourth presentation is a travel presentation of a trip to a French speaking part of the world.

- CHAPTER TEST ASSESSMENT
- For each of the three chapter tests, there are 2 parts: one written and one oral.

- **Written Part => at home**
Each test will cover two chapters, for a total of three tests for six chapters. The written part of each Chapter Test will be on Canvas Chapters Modules. Beware that there will be strict timing and once you start the written test you cannot stop. There are guidelines to help you succeed on the written test in Chapters Modules. The conditions of taking the test will be the same as if in a classroom: no book or else. :-) Your success relies on your regular work, your motivation, and your intellectual integrity
- **Oral Part => in class / individually**
For each written test, there is an individual Oral interview test of 3- 5 minutes in French with the instructor, for a total of three Oral Interviews Tests. It will be done in Zoom class during regular class hours respecting the announced date and following alphabetic order or else. There will be guidelines to help you succeed on the Oral Interview Test. It will be on Chapters Modules
- **Chapter Tests Combination: Chapters 1-2 / Chapters 3-4 / Chapters 5-6**

QUIZ ASSESSMENT

- There will be 2-4 quizzes per chapter, it will be one to two quizzes per week. If you want to check what to review, and what is the due date, please go to Chapters Modules.
RETEST- The week before finals you will have the opportunity to retake any/all of the chapter tests to replace your original score. This option is available as long as you have attended tutoring with Dr. Pastrana or the embedded tutor for 5 hours for each exam to be made up.
FINAL TEST ASSESSMENT : Our Final Test will be in two parts.
- **Final Written Test => done at home**
It is a cumulative exam including an assortment of concepts from the six chapters. You will take the Final Written Test on Quizzes* Canvas. Beware there will be strict timing on the Final Written Test and once you start you cannot stop. Important to be prepared! There will be guidelines to help you succeed on written/oral tests at Chapters Modules. The conditions of taking the test will be the same as if in a classroom: **no book or else.** :-) Your success relies on your regular work, your motivation, and your intellectual integrity.
- **Final Oral-Interview Test => done in class / individually**
The Final Oral Interview Test: It is an oral test of 3-5 minutes in French with the instructor covering various topics studied in class and at home. It will be done in class respecting the announced date of the Final Exam date, following alphabetic order or else. There will be guidelines to help you succeed in the Final oral-Interview Test.

This format is similar to the three Chapter Tests that you will take during the semester.

Language Learning Outcomes for French 100

There is a distinction between Performance and Proficiency in a language.

Performance is a level of mastery as demonstrated in a controlled situation, such as a semi-scripted conversation or an exam. Proficiency is the ability to use language in a spontaneous interaction and non-rehearsed context, and in a manner acceptable and appropriate to native speakers of the language.

The following Students Learning Outcomes are based on the American Council on the Teaching



of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) Skill Level descriptions.

The student who completes this course with a B or better will be able to:

1. SPEAK at a performance level equal to Novice High. Begin to create with language using simple sentences. Attempt to express own meaning. Maintain simple conversations on familiar topics. Ask and answer most basic questions. In some contexts, language may still be mostly memorized words and phrases.
2. LISTEN at a performance level equal to Novice High. Understand words and phrases from questions, statements, high-frequency commands and formulaic expressions. Comprehend sentence-level speech in basic personal and social contexts where there is extralingual support.
3. READ at a performance level equal to Intermediate Low. Identify the main ideas of appropriate texts, when the topic is familiar. Infer meaning of unfamiliar words and phrases, though not all may be accurate.
4. WRITE at a performance level equal to Novice High. Begin to create with language using simple sentences. Attempt to express own meaning while focusing on successful task completion. In some contexts still uses memorized words and phrases. Vocabulary conveys basic meaning.
5. DEMONSTRATE CULTURAL KNOWLEDGE. Gain knowledge of and sensitivity to the political, historical, social, philosophical and economic underpinnings of the language's culture(s), including elements such as geography, history, literature and the arts, ethnicities, customs, philosophies and values.
6. PRACTICE CULTURAL SENSITIVITY. Use language to reflect authentic cultural practices and perspectives in a limited way. Begin to be aware of the value of the differences between U.S. culture and the language culture(s).
