Course Description

This course provides an overview of art and architecture from the Renaissance to the contemporary period. This course may be taken by itself, after, before, or concurrently with ART 100. (C-ID: ARTH 120) (CSU/UC)

- 3. Analyze, discuss, and distinguish the roles of art, architecture, and the artist from the Renaissance to the contemporary period.

Late Work



Late work interrupts the flow of learning in this course and could cause serious problems.

Discussions are designed to be interactive—the feedback you give to and get from your peers is just as valuable as any feedback you will receive from me. There is no make-up possible for these.

For this reason, late work is discouraged, and some late work will not be accepted. Late work will receive a 15% reduction in the grade. Work submitted after 1 week of the due date – or after the end of the semester - will not be accepted.

If an emergency arises, such as illness or a family emergency, please let me know as soon as possible. I can't reiterate enough that your success is my central goal, but your success also involves a partnership between you and me that is supported by strong communication.

Essay Grading Policy:

- Essays are graded on a percent of 100.
- Grade reflects the overall quality of the work turned in, how complete the work is and whether the instructions from the assignment were properly followed.
- A rubric will be used to grade the essays. Please be sure to read it before submitting your assignment.
- Missing or unsatisfactory work will be scored "no credit." This is a 0 (F) and averaged into your grade.
- Essays that do not follow the prompt instructions will receive a 0 (F).

Essays & Plagiarism:

- You will be writing one short written opinion and one 600–900-word opinion on an artwork.
- Writing assignments will be turned into a plagiarism and AI checker.
 - Faculty and tech staff have tested the screening tools for plagiarism and AI and they work very reliably.
- So that your essay is not cited for plagiarism, the report should be 15% or less and not have even one completely copied sentence from a source.
- Any essay that is suspected of plagiarism will receive a zero.
- TURN OFF GRAMMARLY. DO NOT USE CHATGPT. DO NOT USE GOOGLE TRANSLATE OR SOME OTHER TRANLATING SERVICE. These will ensure your writing is flagged for 100% AI usage. You do not need it for this course. Your use of grammar is not assessed. I appreciate the individual voices and writing styles of students.

Discussion Forums:

Late or Make Up posts are not possible as Discussions are meant to be interactive.

Your discussion forum consists of three parts:

- 1. **Part 1**: Your initial post.
- 2. Part 2: Response to two or your peers.
- 3. Make sure to answer all questions asked in the prompt.
- 4. In your initial response make sure to be aware of academic language, paragraph structure, sentence structure, and grammar to the best of your ability.



Ouizzes:

- Quizzes are given throughout the semester.
- Be aware of the due dates.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out- of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Note: The above statement means this class should take you approximately 5 hours per week during a normal semester, Spring and Fall. Shortened sessions such as Summer and Winter move quickly enabling you to complete the class in a few weeks.
