Class Requirements and Instructional Methods: Participants are expected to attend choir class regularly and punctually. Participants will participate wholeheartedly in all class activities, including warm-ups, rehearsal of varied choral repertoire, marking of musical scores as appropriate, and more. Participants will attend scheduled musical performances and give of their best. Participants will be orderly and disciplined during choir classes and performances, and endeavor to maintain proper decorum. Talking should be minimized or non-existent during rehearsals and performances. Participants will be great team-members of the choral ensemble. Participants will gain confidence in themselves as blossoming musical artistes. Please note that this is a Choral Performance Class, hence participation in Concerts is important and mandatory.

In addition to ensemble performances, there will also be VOCAL SOLOS, for those who wish to share their wonderful talents.

Indeed, Concerts will be done via F2F/In-Person; as well as Livestreaming since we also have an ONLINE Modality Capacities.

There will be at least 3 Concerts/Presentations, a Mid-Semester one and Final Concerts. These Concerts will be On-Campus, and in the Imperial Valley Community. Our IVC Choral Ensembles usually sing for IVC Commencement Ceremonies in Spring Semesters.
