## **Course Description**

This course reviews ethical and legal standards required by the industry, state entities, or federal entities and affecting the practice of addiction prevention and addiction counseling of adults and minors. Course will address specific requirements of the judicial system, Department of Children's Protective Services, the Department of Adult Protective Services, and the Department of Mental Health. ### **Course Objectives**

- 1. understand ethical responsibilities to clients, colleagues and various agencies.
- 2. understand and deal with ethical dilemmas in the therapeutic setting for individuals, groups and families.
- 3. reflect on personal ethical framework and ethical issues that arise in a learning environment.
- 4. recognize the importance of ethical standards in an addiction counseling work place and the impact on the scope of practice and limitations of an addiction counselor.



- 5. restate the confidentiality mandates as related to client treatment, ethical counseling, management of client information in teaching, and conducting research.
- 6. identify critical elements of the California Business and Professions Code specific to the scope of practice, competency, licensing, continuing education, and potential disciplinary actions for Certified ADS Abuse Counselors and Certified Addiction Treatment Specialists.

<u>Case Studies</u>: Students will be assigned or will choose a real or hypothetical case related to substance use disorder (SUD) or a behavioral addiction (e.g., gambling, gaming). Ensure the case is relevant to ethical and legal considerations in addiction treatment. If using real cases, ensure confidentiality by changing names, locations, and other identifying information. Your case study should include Introduction, Background Information, Ethical Considerations, Legal Considerations, Treatment and Intervention and Outcome and Reflection. Format your case study using APA style and cite relevant ethical codes (e.g., APA Ethics Code, NASW Code of Ethics) and legal statutes. Paper must be in APA format.

<u>Mid-Term and Final Exam</u>: Exam will cover chapters and course material throughout the semester. The Midterm and Final exams are entirely multiple-choice. Some chapters listed may not be covered in class, but you are still responsible for the material, unless otherwise specified. No makeup for exams will be given without prior notification and/or documentation of an emergency.

<u>Quizzes:</u> Quizzes will Quizzes may include any or all the following types of questions: multiple choice, true-false, matching, fill-in-the-blank, and short answer/essay. If you are late to class or absent, you will not be allowed to take the quizzes or exams. No makeup for exams or quizzes will be given without prior notification and/or documentation of an emergency. <u>In Class Assignments:</u> Students will complete in class assignments that will not be announced prior. These assignments will focus on chapter readings, articles and other resources associated with legal and ethical standards in addiction disorder counseling.

Students are expected to read all assigned chapters as noted in syllabus. Although we may or may not cover all of the material shown and the dates are approximations, students will however be required to know all the material assigned in reading and other material given in class.
