# **Course Description**

The standard first-year English course. The course seeks to improve the student's ability to understand serious and complex prose and to improve the student's ability to write an exposition that is thoughtful and clear, including the production of a well-documented research paper. Limitation on Enrollment: Course not open to students with a C or higher in English 105. (C-ID: ENGL 100) (CSU/UC)

# Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Eligibility for English 110 as determined by the college's multiple measures assessment process.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Compose college-level essays that contain clear thesis statements, effective support, and unified organization.
- 2. Synthesize information from multiple sources to produce a research paper that is formatted and documented according to MLA guidelines.
- 3. Demonstrate an ability to comprehend and interpret a variety of college-level texts, including complex arguments and at least one full-length novel, play, or non-fiction book, without relying on outside sources for assistance.

## **Course Objectives**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Write multiple essays—including one research paper and one final exam—that, together, add up to 6,000 words of formal writing
- 2. Demonstrate a command of the writing process, which may include pre-writing, drafting, revising, self-editing, peer group editing, and proofreading
- 3. Compose error-free essays that avoid sentence-level and grammar problems
- 4. Compose unified essays that include support for the thesis statement, clear development, and effective transitions



- 5. Demonstrate a command of writing patterns by effectively integrating various rhetorical modes, such as compare/contrast, definition, cause/effect, and argumentation together to produce sophisticated, college-level essays as appropriate
- 6. Demonstrate an ability to adapt writing strategies to the requirements of the writing situation (e.g. in-class writing, research writing, reflective writing) or to tailor a written assignment to address specific audiences (both general and academic)
- 7. Demonstrate a thorough understanding of research strategies and library skills (including electronic databases) to identify and evaluate resources for a research paper
- 8. Synthesize information from multiple sources to produce a research paper that is formatted and documented according to MLA guidelines
- 9. Demonstrate a command of rules regarding plagiarism and academic ethics
- 10. Read actively, using metacognitive strategies to monitor comprehension, build vocabulary, and improve analysis of college-level texts
- 11. Analyze the rhetorical context when reading by identifying genre, medium, purpose, audience and tone
- 12. Analyze and evaluate the strategies an author uses to make and support a claim, including the use of fallacies
- 13. Synthesize knowledge by relating texts to personal experience, to past and present events, and to other texts

# **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

## **Textbook/Novel Readings**

Every week you will have assigned readings that should be done before class. For example, on Tuesday's before class you will have to have read the chapter of the textbook as indicated in the class schedule; on Thursday's you will have to have read the indicated pages of the novel assigned before class as indicated in the class schedule as well.

Every Monday there will be an article or topic posted which you will read before class on Tuesday's.

## **Research and Writing Assignments**

There will be six research assignments due every other week until the end of April. These essays/ assignments will be MLA style (double spaced, Times New Roman font, font size 12), and be approximately 700 words/ 3 pages (not including

Works Cited page). These assignments will be of a topic of your choice or you may choose one discussed in class based on the novel or weekly readings.

There will be a final Research paper on the topic of your choice which must follow MLA guidelines. This assignment must include 1,500 words, the equivalent of 5 pages.

#### In Class Activities

## **Textbook Lecture**

- Every week there will be a lecture/powerpoint based on the chapter assigned on Tuesday's. This lecture will be continued on Thursday's if not concluded in the prior lecture. Students will be expected to take notes of topics of most importance.
- The Brief Wondrous Life of Oscar Wao will be discussed in class on Thursdays.

## **Weekly Reading Activity**

• The short readings posted online on Monday's will be discussed in class on Tuesday and you will do minimal independent research on the topic to bring ideas to class on Thursday's in order to take part in the class activity (either a journal entry or introduction paragraph). The introduction paragraph composed in class may be used to expand for the research assignment due on the following Monday or as indicated.

#### **Peer Review**

• Students will bring the rough draft of their Research Paper to class the Thursday before it is due for submission online. The Tuesday before the Final Draft is due, students will bring into class for a final peer review before submission.

#### Quizzes

There will be five quizzes in class based on the readings as a form of evaluation.

## **Final Exam**

The final exam will consist of a 300 word essay written in class on the final day of our class. The topic will be explained prior to the exam.
