### Course Description

This course will serve as an introduction to assessment and treatment approaches to alcoholism and drug abuse. Alcoholism will be studied in its social and clinical context. Attention will be given to the basic theoretical approaches to the disease. This course will examine the various components of intervention, treatment, recovery, and resources. (CSU)

6. demonstrate an intervention in a family or work station.

### Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Final Exam: Exam will cover chapters and course material throughout the semester. Final exams are entirely multiple-choice. Some chapters listed may not be covered in class, but you are still responsible for the material, unless otherwise specified. Case Studies: For this assignment, students will select or be assigned a real or hypothetical case involving an individual with a Substance Use Disorder (SUD) or behavioral addiction (e.g., gambling, gaming). The goal is to analyze and apply appropriate intervention strategies. If using a real case, all identifying information must be changed to maintain confidentiality. Format your case study using APA style.

Students are expected to read all assigned chapters as noted in syllabus. Although, we may or may not cover all of the material shown and the dates are approximations, students will however be required to know all the material assigned in reading and other material given in class.
