Course Description

NURS 80 is a nursing course that introduces nursing and the study of nursing, including the roles of the registered nurse, as well as profession-related and patient care concepts. Differentiation is made between the role of the health aide, vocational nurse, and registered nurse. The student will become familiar with the expectations and realities of becoming a student nurse. Utilizing a variety of topics, activities, examinations, and general information, this course is designed to assist the student in developing strategies for success in the nursing program. The focus will be on developing critical thinking, problem-solving, and clinical judgment skills. Emphasis is placed on the knowledge and skills needed to provide safe, quality care. The theoretical foundation for basic assessment and nursing skills is presented, and the student is given an opportunity to demonstrate these basic skills in a clinical laboratory setting. The philosophy, conceptual framework, objectives, guidelines, and policies of the nursing program and the role of the student in developing accountability, integrity, and meeting the standards of academic and clinical conduct will be affirmed.

The course pre-requisite is the acceptance to the ADRN Program

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Identify strategies for personal and academic success in the Imperial Valley College Associate Degree Nursing program. (IL03).
2. Demonstrate respect and sensitivity for the professional role through appropriate behavior, being prompt for clinical experience, meetings, learning activities, class, and assignment deadlines.
3. Identify reasons for dismissal from the ADRN program.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Identify factors that promote or inhibit success in the ADRN program.
2. State changes needed in one's personal life to meet the challenges and demands of the ADRN program.
3. Identify activities designed to meet the challenges and demands to be successful in the ADRN program, including time management and study skills.
4. Develop critical thinking, problem-solving, and clinical judgment skills at the basic level.
5. Achieve a 92% on Math Examinations, and complete tests within the given time frame.
6. Recognize that the APA format is used for all written work in the ADRN program. Familiarize yourself with the APA format.
7. Educate yourself on the available financial resources, such as scholarships and financial aid.
8. Develop a plan for financial management while in the ADRN program.
9. Discuss the risks of employment while in the ADRN program.
10. Apply and analyze the information in the ADRN Student Handbook.
11. Review and discuss the parameters of the ANA Code of Ethics and pertinent ethical and legal concepts.
12. Discuss the role of the student nurse and the scope of nursing practice related to the established code of ethics, nurse practice acts, and professional registrations/ certifications.
13. Discuss reasons for dismissal from the ADRN program: unprofessional conduct, cheating, HIPAA violations.
14. Demonstrate basic nursing skills using proper techniques and measures that ensure patient safety: 60-second assessments, infection control, hand washing, vital signs, patient safety, positioning patients in bed, transferring patients and utilizing proper body mechanics.
15. Explain the principles and underlying concepts for the identified basic nursing skills.

Student Rights & Responsibilities

Nursing students are expected to promote self-accountability for their actions and to foster cultures of civility and a high standard of civil, respectful, and professional conduct in all academic and clinical interactions. Violations are subject to student disciplinary actions, including but not limited to a student's removal, suspension, or expulsion.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official class meeting. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See [General Catalog](#) for details.
- Students who are late to class three times in any nursing course will be considered absent for one day. Class includes lectures, clinical, and skills labs.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student who has continuous, unexcused absence Exceeds the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week and may be dropped. NUR 80 is a synchronous class course. There is a total of 9 class meetings for this summer session. Missing more than 1 day of class may be considered for dismissal from the course. Please inform me of any emergency circumstances.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences.
- Students actively enrolled in the Imperial Valley College Associate Degree Nursing Program are required to attend all classes and complete all clinical practice assignments. Absences will be limited to the maximum allowable number of hours absent. A student who reaches the maximum allowable number of hours absent will file a petition to remain in the nursing program. The student will meet with the teaching team to discuss the situation and may be considered for dismissal.

Face-to-Face Classroom/Clinical/Lab Practice Etiquette

Students must always adhere to the IVC nursing student code of conduct and professional behavior outlined in the RN student handbook when interacting face-to-face, in lab practice, and clinical settings. Those out of compliance with these standards and guidelines are subject to placement on a behavioral contract.

- Electronic Devices: Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class unless otherwise directed by the instructor.
- Students may not use recording devices in the classroom or skills labs unless they have been documented by the IVC Disability Support Program and Services (DSPS).
- Food and Drink are prohibited in all classrooms. Water bottles with lids/caps are the only exception. Additional restrictions will apply in labs. Please comply with the instructor's directions.

Disruptive Students

Students who disrupt or interfere with a class are out compliance of student code of conduct and unprofessional behavior outlined in the RN student handbook. The student or students may be sent out of the classroom, lab, or clinical setting and will meet with the course nursing instructor(s) or team, as well as the Assistant Dean of Nursing. Disciplinary procedures will be followed as outlined in the RN student handbook.

Children in the classroom: Due to college rules and state laws, only students enrolled in the class are allowed to attend; children are not permitted.

Recording Device: Students MAY NOT use recording devices unless documented on the DSPS accommodation sheet. If it is documented, the recording device must be placed on the table or podium in front of the instructor at the beginning of class.

Online Netiquette

What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.

- Always follow the IVC nursing student code of conduct, professional behavior, and social media guidelines and policies outlined in the RN student handbook.

Guidelines when texting or emailing IVC staff, nursing faculty, nursing tutors, and classmates:

Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette:

1. Identify yourself. Greet your contact properly. Always use formal titles (i.e. “Dear Mrs. Ramirez,” “Hello, Mrs. Anderson,”).
2. Include a subject line
3. Be polite. Avoid sarcasm. Always remember to say “please” and “thank you” as necessary
4. Respect others’ opinions and privacy
5. Acknowledge and return messages promptly,
6. Copy with caution
7. Do not spam or junk mail
8. Be concise, positive and friendly
9. Use appropriate language
10. Use appropriate emotions (emotional icons) to help convey meaning
11. Use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].
12. Proofread your email before sending it.

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another’s work and recognize the importance of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Instead, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one’s “own” writings or ideas of others without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to “cite a source” correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment.
- Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in their file.

****Note: RN student handbook policies on academic dishonesty supersedes IVC General Catalog and may be subject to change from the program.** Acts of cheating include but are not limited to, the following: (a) plagiarism; (b) copying or attempting to copy from others during an examination or on an assignment; (c) communicating test information with another person during an examination; (d) allowing others to do an assignment or portion of an assignment; (e) using a commercial term paper service.

How do I show academic honesty and integrity on an online platform?

- **KEEP YOUR PASSWORDS CONFIDENTIAL.**
- You have unique passwords to access online software, such as Canvas, The Point, and ATI. Never allow someone else to log in to your account.

- **COMPLETE YOUR “OWN” COURSEWORK.**

When you register for an online class and log in to Canvas, you do so with the understanding that you will produce your “own” work, take your “own” exams, and will do so without the assistance of others (unless directed by the instructor).

Examples of Academic Dishonesty that can occur in an online environment:

- Copying from others on a quiz, test, examination, or assignment.
- Allowing someone else to copy your answers on a quiz, test, exam, or assignment.
