A basic course in drawing from observation as an essential means of expression. The focus is on contour line drawing, mass and line gesture, and value structure in creating the illusion of form. Both dry and wet media are used. Additional materials fee applies.(C-ID: ARTS 110) (CSU/UC)

- 1. Write a descriptive essay on a contemporary exhibition.
- 2. Identify and create types of line drawings: contour, gesture, blind contour, cross contour, hatched, cross hatched.
- 3. Assemble a final portfolio with all work created during the semester.

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the basic principles of linear perspective in showing space on a two-dimensional plane
- 2. Demonstrate proficiency using the techniques of contour line drawing, gesture drawing, and value structure drawing
- 3. Understand the principles of composition, proportion and texture
- 4. Master a number of dry drawing media to realistically render subjects from direct observation
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge about various drawing styles in art history and cultures
- 6. Verbally articulate ideas and processes in drawing

# **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

This course takes place live on zoom. It is required that you come to each live zoom meeting. Assignments will be submitted on canvas, and you will receive your grade there as well. The list of assignments is shown in the next section. Expect to work several hours outside of class each week on the drawing assignments to receive a passing grade.

# **Course Grading Based on Course Objectives**

#### LATE WORK AND REDOS

Assignments will be downgraded if they are late. In-progress assignments can be submitted 1 day late for a 20% deduction, after this it can always be can be submitted to the canvas inbox for feedback. Final assignments can be submitted late up to the last day of the semester. These projects will receive 10% deduction if they are under 7 days late. If the assignment is 7 or more days late they will receive a 20% deduction. Discussions done late will receive a 10% deduction and cannot be completed after 2 days past the deadline. Late work may not be graded as promptly as regularly submitted work, and may not receive feedback.

If you can improve an assignment, you are encouraged to re-do any regular assignment and re-submit it for an improved score. If the original assignment was handed in late you will not be able to re-submit it for an improved score – so hand your work in on time! The final project cannot be resubmitted for an improved grade.

Any exceptions to the above policy will require a written doctor's note or other documentation of an extenuating circumstance. Long-term physical conditions should be brought to the attention of Disability Programs and Services, as they are best able to help with these circumstances. Any exceptions for late work, outside of those recommended by DPS, are at the discretion of the instructor.



### IN-PROGRESS POSTING

An in-progress posting is when you post your drawing to a discussion board to show your work to the class and get feedback from the instructor. There will be about 15 of these postings throughout the semester and they are worth 2 pt each, for a total of about 30 points. These will need to be posted by the deadline to get full credit and timely feedback. In-progress submissions need to be completed at the full-scale of the final drawing, in-progress drawings done at a smaller scale will receive a 10-50% deduction.

# **GROUP DISCUSSIONS**

Group discussions are where we talk as a class, share our ideas, and usually our artwork. There will be a discussion to introduce ourselves to the class, a discussion at the culmination of each project, a couple in-progress discussions for the final project, and maybe an extra discussion sometime during the semester. The discussions will have defined questions that have room for your interpretation and expression. They are worth 1 pt each for a total of about 15 pts (this may vary by a couple of points depending on if any discussions are removed from the schedule).

# **GRADING (IN CLASS & HOMEWORK)**

Both in-class and at-home assignments are assigned a letter grade and points according to the following criteria.

A (9-10 pts): Student demonstrates advanced level understanding of concepts, techniques, and media inherent to the assignment. Student goes above and beyond to create work that exceeds expectations. Student demonstrates continuous and advanced growth. Solutions to assignments demonstrate exceptional imagination, originality, and creative ability. Work is submitted with pristine level of presentation: no creases, wrinkles, or unintended smudges/marks.

**B (8 pts):** Student demonstrates above average understanding of concepts, techniques, and media inherent to assignment. Student successfully fulfills the parameters of the assignment, partially exceeding expectations, but leaving room for improvement. Student demonstrates continuous growth. Solutions to assignments demonstrate some imagination, originality, and creative ability. Work is submitted with very high level of presentation: no creases, wrinkles, or unintended smudges/marks.

**C (7 pts):** Student demonstrates basic understanding of concepts, techniques, and media inherent to assignment. Student fulfills parameters of assignment without exceeding expectations, leaving room for improvement. Evidence of average time and effort required to achieve results. Student demonstrates some growth. Solutions to assignments demonstrate average imagination, originality, and creative ability. Work is



submitted with acceptable attention paid to presentation: minimal creases, wrinkles, or unintended smudges/marks.

**D(6 pts):** Student does not demonstrate basic understanding. Student does not fulfill some or all of the parameters of the assignment. Assignment lacks evidence of a minimum of time and effort required to achieve successful results. Student demonstrates very little or no evidence of growth. Student demonstrates little or no care for presentation.

**F (1-5pts):** Student does not demonstrate understanding of concepts and techniques being measured. Student invests less than minimum amount of time and effort to achieve satisfactory results. Student demonstrates no growth. Student demonstrates little/no care for presentation.

#### **FINAL GRADE**

The final letter grade is assigned according to the percentage of points earned out of the total available points in the course (ie. 190 pts). This number is an estimate, the final points may vary by a few points. This percentage can be calculated by dividing the total number of points earned in the course by the total number of points available and multiplying this number by 100. What grade bracket your percentage falls into will determine your final grade. Removing an assignment may alter the total number of points slightly.

Keep in mind that while natural ability and talent are welcomed, they do not necessarily guarantee a high grade. Students who take initiative, are self-motivated, are unafraid to redo assignments, and are generally willing to go the extra mile will stand a good chance of receiving a higher grade. Just because you don't feel that you have any ability or talent for drawing doesn't mean you can't get an A in my class. I will teach you how to draw!
