Course Description

This course is an introduction to music literature focusing on listening experience. Students
study major forms of music literature, including rich expression of music and music in the
Middle Ages, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical and Romantic eras as well as 20th century, Jazz,
American music, Rock and non- Western music.

- 4. Student will know the names of the most important Baroque composers and their most significant compositions. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)



Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the place of music within human society since prehistory.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the materials of music (rhythm, melody, harmony, timbre, texture, and smaller forms-motive, phrase, sentence, period, one-part, Binary, Ternary).

- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the larger forms of music (song forms, fugue, rondo, theme and variations, Baroque sonata, sonata-allegro, Classical sonata cycle, concerto, symphony, string quartet, etc.).

- 5. Develop skills as an active (as opposed to passive) listener appropriate to the study of music.

	This course is conducted entirely face-to-face , and students are required to attend all scheduled class sessions in person. Weekly module content will be made available on Canvas to supplement in-class learning, and reviewing this material regularly is essential for successful progress in the course.
	Throughout the duration of this class, the following assignments must be completed according to the class schedule:
	Assessments – The course includes four quizzes, three exams, and two discussions. These will be conducted primarily during class time . However, in cases of excused absence or special circumstances, students may be allowed to complete certain assessments online via the Canvas Quiz section with prior approval.
	Quizzes – These in-class assessments evaluate students' understanding of musical forms and genres across different historical periods. Most quizzes and exams consist of multiple-choice questions (except Quiz 1) and may allow two attempts if administered online as a make-up.
	Essay Assignment – Students will choose a composer from a list provided by the professor and write an essay based on the composer's life, musical style, and notable works. This assignment will be discussed in class and submitted electronically via Canvas.
	Outside-of-Class Workload – In accordance with Department of Education guidelines, one (1)

credit hour represents at least one hour of classroom instruction and approximately two to four



hours of independent work each week over the course of the semester. This includes reading assignments, listening practice, and essay preparation.
