Course Description

In this course, students receive instruction in academic reading and writing, including writing processes, effective use of language, analytical thinking, and the foundations of academic research. (Formerly ENGL 110)(C-ID: ENGL 100)(CSU/UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Compose college-level essays that contain clear thesis statements, effective support, and unified organization.
- 2. Synthesize information from multiple sources to produce a research paper that is formatted and documented according to MLA guidelines.
- 3. Demonstrate an ability to comprehend and interpret a variety of college-level texts, including complex arguments, without relying on outside sources for assistance.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

Part 1:

- 1. Read analytically to understand and respond to diverse academic texts.
- 2. Compose thesis-driven academic writing that demonstrates analysis and synthesis of sources as appropriate to the rhetorical situation.
- 3. Demonstrate strategies for planning, outlining, drafting, revising, editing, and proofreading written work.

Part 2:

- 1. Compose unified essays that include support for the thesis statement, clear development, and effective transitions
- 2. Demonstrate a thorough understanding of research strategies and library skills (including electronic databases) to identify and evaluate resources for a research paper
- 3. Synthesize information from multiple sources to produce a research paper that is formatted and documented according to MLA guidelines



4. Demonstrate a command of rules regarding plagiarism and academic ethics

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course is about learning how to express yourself critically. We will read academic and literary texts in the class and analyze together. In addition, you will respond in the form of discussion and reflective journals, to the texts. At the same time, you will learn how to organize and write college-level essays and write one research paper.

It is extremely important to do each of the assignments on time because they build upon each other.

Each week, I will open up the module Sunday night at 11:59 pm. Modules include reading, discussions, lessons, and assignments. Assignments will be due by end of the week, Sunday 11:59 pm. Quizzes and discussions cannot be made up and will be closed at the end of the week. All other homework will lose 1% per day. If you have an emergency, please let me know so I can hep you.

C-1000 ACADEMIC READING AND WRITING AI POLICY



"It is better to know how to learn than to know." - Dr. Seuss

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is a tool taking the world by storm. It was first created to speed up business processes, but now it influences how we think, write, and create. While AI is powerful, the way humans truly learn has not changed: **learning requires effortful work**.

As your teacher, my goal is to help you grow into a strong, independent thinker who can express yourself clearly in this new world. All can do the *work for you, but it cannot do the learning for you*. Real learning only happens when you practice thinking, analyzing, and creating for yourself.

I am not against AI — I use AI, but I also know how to read, write, and think critically. I believe before you can use artificial tools well, you need a strong foundation in your own skills. My responsibility as your teacher is to help you build that foundation.

This is my policy:

- 1) I appeal first to your integrity if you want to learn, do the work yourself.
- 2) Unless otherwise stated, all assignments in this class are to be completed without the use of AI tools. This includes ChatGPT, Grammarly (beyond basic spell check), and any other AI-assisted writing tools. Spell check is fine. We will have specific moments in the semester to explore AI together in a guided way, so you can learn how to use it responsibly and with purpose.

Consequence for AI use:

- 3) I love my job because I get to help students grow, not because I want to spend my time acting like a "police officer" checking for cheating. This is what is happening in schools now. If I must put on my "police hat" instead of my "professor hat,":
 - a. I will always talk to you first. You will have the opportunity to redo the assignment within a specific amount of time (with penalty of being late).
 - b. If cheating or plagiarism continues, I will report you to my department chair, who will have the same discussion with you. We cannot give a college degree to a person who does not know how to think.

When can you use AI:

I have created assignments where we can practice using AI responsibly and ethically together. This will be very clear in the assignments.

If you don't know or are you confused about AI – always come to me FIRST before you use it.

Let's work together to make sure that doesn't happen — communicate early if you need help or an extension due to an emergency.

 - a. A reliable computer (preferably a laptop)
 - b. Consistent, dependable internet access

If you do not have access to a computer/Wi-Fi, please let me know as soon as possible.

2. We will read *Frankenstein* this semester. The book is available online on CANVAS so you do not have to buy it. However, if you are able, I recommend printing it yourself or purchasing a physical copy (make sure it is the **1818 version**).

Reading on paper has been shown to make increase reading comprehension. A study from the University of Valencia found that reading print could boost skills six to eight times more than reading digitally. You can read the full article here: Reading print improves comprehension far more than looking at digital text, say researchers — The Guardian
